REMOTE LEARNING FEEDBACK

It would be great if the same format was used when different teachers are teaching e.g., being able to edit the work, etc.

We have moved to a single remote learning team so that we can be as consistent as possible. This should mean that the work set is also consistent.

I really like to see my teachers. It makes me happy. I like to see my friends joining in, too.

We like to see everyone, too!

My child is doing his school work at home very well but sometimes finds it difficult to keep up and play catch up when child goes to grand parents' houses for childcare, due to work reasons.

Don't feel too pressured in these situations- nothing is straight-forward. We want all children accessing as much of the remote learning as possible but we know there are situations when it is not possible. We appreciate that you are doing your best!

The lessons on the laptop are great... I am just rubbish on the laptop. i.e., this morning, I had to log off it, as I didn't know how to take the camera off, although my child still listened to the story and has drawn a thermometer, which was set. Sorry.

Please don't be sorry for struggling with the technology. We were able to help this family with a school appointment. Please speak to the school office to get some support.

Microsoft TEAMS is a bit difficult to get used to. My child has followed the steps by using the calendar to get into his live lessons but there are always more than one live lesson to choose from and he has gone in to the wrong one a couple of times and had to wait until the lesson had been uploaded to watch again.

We have made changes to avoid this happens now, so hopefully, it won't be a problem for you anymore. The cameras on would be great. My son is missing his friends so much he would love to see them. Especially having 2 much older sisters he doesn't see anyone his age now.

We introduced cameras in the final week of last half-term. From Monday, the teachers will be holding a brief, daily well-being check with cameras on, as part of the lesson.

This week he has had the opportunity to share at the end of the lesson his favourite food or activity and that's made him so happy, it's a good incentive to get through the lesson. More of this simple stuff would be good. Overall we are happy as possible with the amount of assignments and live lessons. It's enough with me having others at home and a job to do outside the home. Perhaps some encouragement to read books and be able to send work in or a picture in of what they have read would be good and encouraging. Thanks for work so far everyone.

Thank you for your positive and helpful feedback. We have now encouraged children to send in their work or a picture. Some of these are on our website. We have also begun practical activities away from a screen through our, 'Screen Free Fridays' initiative.

We are doing the minimum amount of work. It's very hard to motivate them whilst trying not to let your relationship suffer through the stress and nagging. The teachers are doing a great job and I have utter admiration on how they are dealing with this crisis.
